



Chapel Services

Chapel services are an integral part of the *Faith* experience. Every Monday, a split chapel gives opportunity for students to meet together for prayer and deal with issues related to their gender. On Tuesdays and Thursdays, afternoon chapel services bless students with the opportunity to sit under the anointed preaching of outside ministers (pastors, evangelists, and missionaries) as well as faculty. To many, Friday night chapel is the highlight of the week. Fervent praise and worship, special singing, anointed preaching, and plenty of time to spend seeking God – all of these make the Friday night service a life-changing experience.

Conduct

Faith is serious about training leaders. To provide optimum ministerial preparation that produces disciplined, effective leaders, *Faith* has created a uniquely structured learning environment. Upon acceptance, students receive the *Student Handbook*. It explains the details of life at *Faith*. Students are expected to cheerfully abide by the rules. The school's conduct code is based upon the principles of consideration for others and a disciplined lifestyle.

Conventions

Opening, Spiritual Emphasis, & Graduation: Each semester starts with a series of special services featuring a guest speaker. The fall semester begins with Opening Convention and the spring semester starts with Spiritual Emphasis. The year is completed with a graduation convention, culminating with commencement exercises.

Missions Seminar: At the annual fall missions seminar, *Faith's* campus comes alive with activities that stimulate an interest in missions. Contests, flags, videos, and ethnic foods vividly remind us that billions on this planet have yet to hear of God's love. Missionaries share their experiences in workshops and general sessions. All students are challenged to respond – whether by dedicating their lives for full-time mission work or by supporting missions through prayer and financial giving.





Christian Education Seminar: Another exciting event is the Christian Education seminar that occurs each spring. Visiting Christian educators challenge students to consider teaching, administering Christian schools, or ministering in some other field of Christian education – either with children or adults. Christian education is presented as a ministry that exists in many arenas including the church, the school, and the foreign mission field.

Class Organizations

Each class is an important part of *Faith*. Weekly, each class meets for prayer and a business session. Class officers, a missionary representative, yearbook representatives, and class representatives for the Student Association are elected.

Prayer Groups

Missionary Prayers: The World Missions Outreach Group is a student-run organization that meets weekly to support foreign missionaries through fervent prayer and to promote missions interest on campus.

Soul-Winning Prayers: Students who have a strong heart for the lost gather weekly during a lunch period to fast and pray for the unsaved. Prayer lists are maintained and remembered. Students rejoice as word comes back that individuals on the lists have come to Christ.

Campus Days

Each fall and spring, a three-day Campus Days weekend gives prospective students an opportunity to experience *Faith* for themselves. Participants arrive Thursday afternoon and leave late Saturday morning. The weekend's activities include informative sessions, class attendance, a school social, and the Friday night chapel service. Students sleep in the dorms and dine in the cafeteria. The free, fun, and informative weekend is open to high school students and graduates. Contact *Faith* for exact dates and a brochure.

Hooper's Corner Café

The lower level of Tracy Hall is home to Hooper's Corner Café, the school snack bar. A favorite social place for students, visitors, staff, and faculty, the snack bar offers a menu of burgers, fries, sandwiches, and ice cream at reasonable prices.

Ministry Placement

The school coordinates a ministry placement service, which helps connect students and graduates with temporary and permanent ministry positions.

Student Association

The Student Association is the liaison between the student body and the Administration. The Student Association, together with the administration, aims to serve the students by maintaining a balance in the spiritual, social, and academic facets of life at *Faith*. The Student Association's ultimate objective is to aid students in receiving all they can from campus life.

Student Association Activities

Welcome Week: Designed to welcome new freshmen, the Welcome Week, held each fall, is a time of fun activities culminating with the Welcome Week Social on Saturday night. Throughout the week, Student Association officers and representatives conduct all daytime chapel services and maintain a special theme.

School Spirit Week: Each spring, a week of activities and class competition comprise School Spirit Week. The winning class is honored on a permanent plaque in the student lounge. Throughout the week, Student Association officers and representatives conduct all daytime chapel services and maintain a special theme. On Saturday, Spirit Week ends with a special social.

Socials: Socials (special events which include fellowship, meals, games, films, skits, and sports) are held several times each year. These fun-filled events provide social interaction and promote school spirit.



Student Ministries

Choir: *Voices of Faith*, the school's choir, travels throughout New England every other weekend and occasionally on short tours beyond New England. The choir is known for the enthusiastic message it conveys in song. Students are admitted to the choir on an audition basis.

Drama: The *Acts of Faith* drama team shares the Gospel through skits, plays, and mime. The group ministers in special campus events as well as in churches and evangelistic outreaches.

Ministry Practicum: The Ministry Practicum program (explained more thoroughly on page 32) gives *Faith* students opportunities to experience ministry firsthand. Half of the program consists of local outreach through church, nursing home, and soup kitchen ministry, in the immediate area. The second aspect of Ministry Practicum is called Crusades, in which small groups of students are sent to churches throughout the Northeast and Canada. There, they minister under the close supervision of experienced pastors. Students sing, teach, testify, preach, witness, receive personal pastoral instruction and mentoring, and even help churches with practical tasks. Through the Crusade program alone, every student will have at least 60 days of hands-on ministry experience upon graduation from *Faith*.

Missions Trips: Periodic missions trips, led by a faculty member, lead students to the field to work with established missionaries or nationals. Trips and destinations vary. In addition to school missions trips, Faith's missions department aids students by linking them with other missions opportunities through a variety of organizations.
